Wildlife champion

Who would have thought that a father's gift of a toy chimpanzee could arouse a life-long passion for the real thing. 'Jubilee', the lifelike chimpanzee in question, still has pride of place on in the home of Dame Jane Goodall, the world's foremost expert on chimpanzees. Goodall's study of wild chimpanzees in Gombe Stream National Park, Tanzania, has now been running for 45 years and represents the world's longest continuous wildlife study so far. Through the research she has undertaken, the life of the chimpanzee has been opened up to us all. We have seen aggression on a frightening scale but have also discovered that they demonstrate tenderness within families units. Goodall also cares for the local human population. The obvious connection between human and wildlife communities became all too apparent to her when she saw the extent of deforestation resulting from local people's economic needs. Goodall was forced to broaden her vision for species conservation and she set up the TACARE (Take Care) programme in an attempt to provide local communities with the means to create sustainable livelihoods. The model for this programme has now been replicated across Africa and a global youth programme 'Roots and Shoots', boasts over 10,000 groups in more than 100 countries.
