

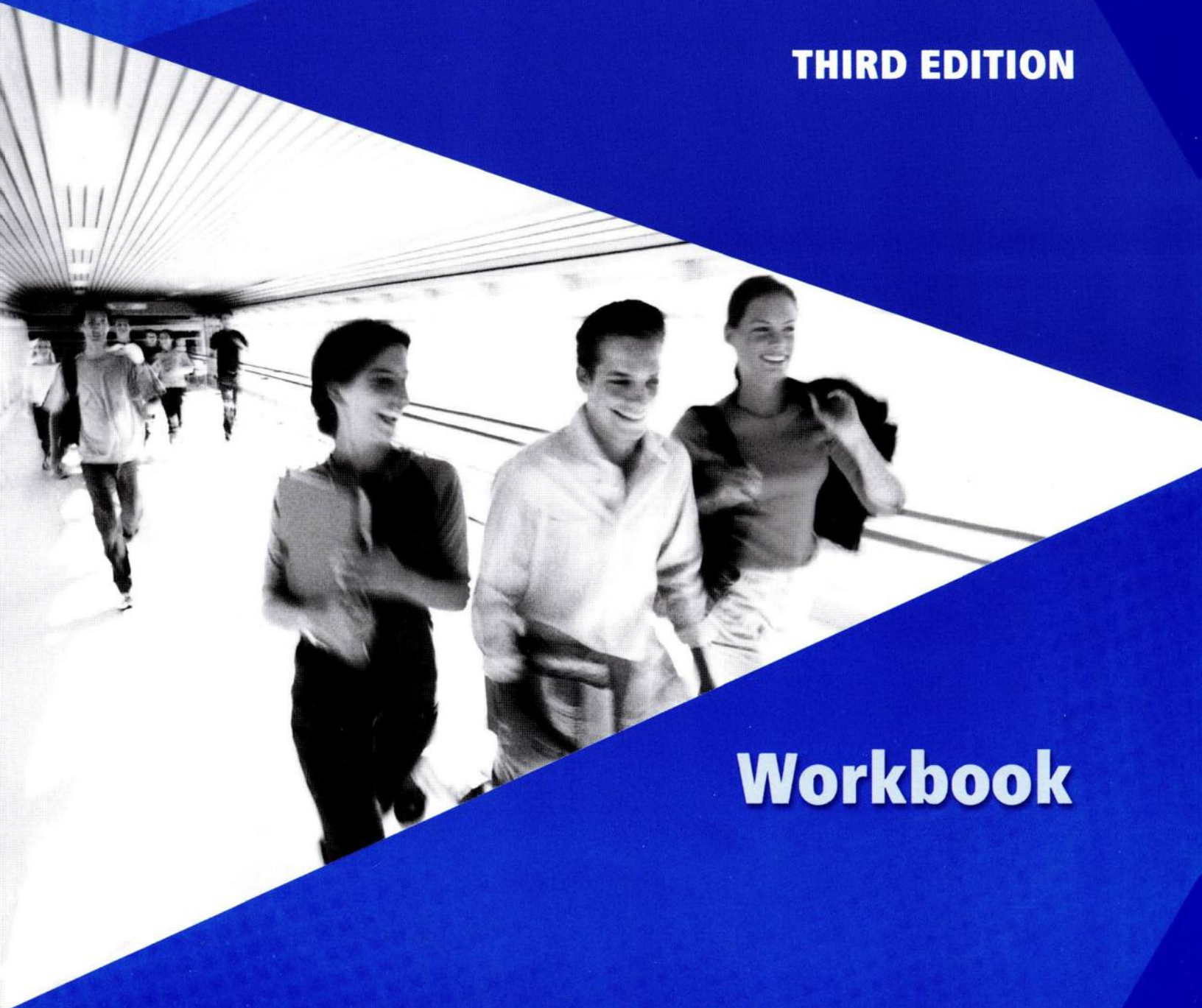

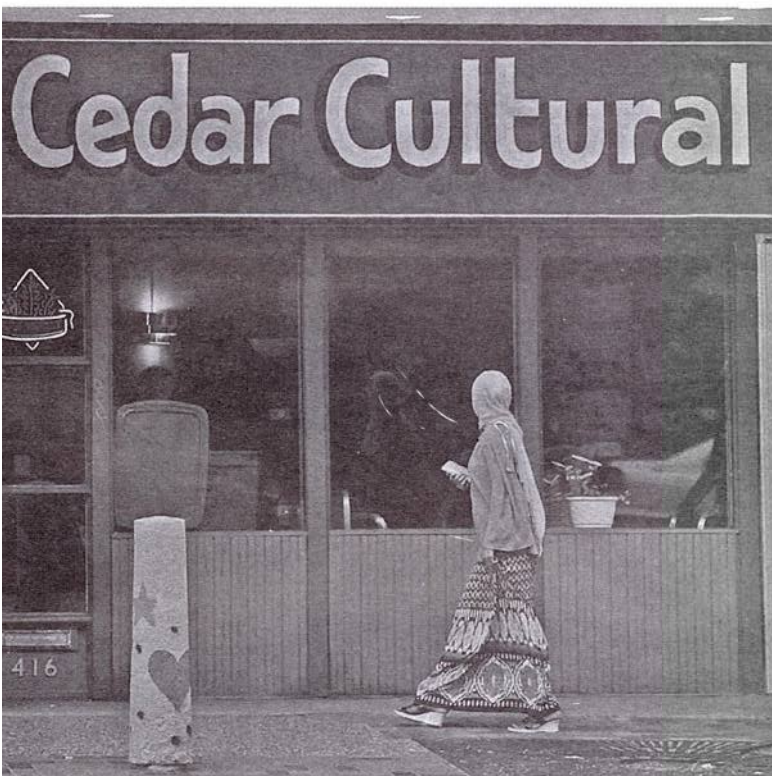

AMERICAN ARTIST, BORN AND BRED

EMMA ANDERSON is one of the U.S.'s best up-and-coming artists.
HENRY LUCAS went to visit her at her home.

Emma Anderson was born in Ashville, North Carolina. She studied at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. She *lives* in a small mountain town with her husband, Duncan, and her three children. Home is a 100-year-old farmhouse which *overlooks* the Great Smoky Mountains. Duncan is a writer and *is working* on his new book.

Emma *paints* animals and wildlife. "I *paint* what I *see* around me," she told me, "birds, animals, trees, and flowers. I *find* my work totally absorbing. I *work* outside in the open air for as long as it is light, from dawn until dusk – about 13 hours a day in the summer, though less now because it's winter."

Her work *is becoming* increasingly popular, and she *is planning* to open a gallery in her town. "Right now I'm *painting* a series of wild flowers," she said to me over coffee in her studio.

The town *is inhabited* by 700 people who *are employed* mainly in the tourism industry. The population *is falling* because young people *are leaving* the town to look for work. The town *is being developed* further as a tourist destination – 50,000 visitors come every year – but it is big enough for Emma to escape and find her inspiration. ☹

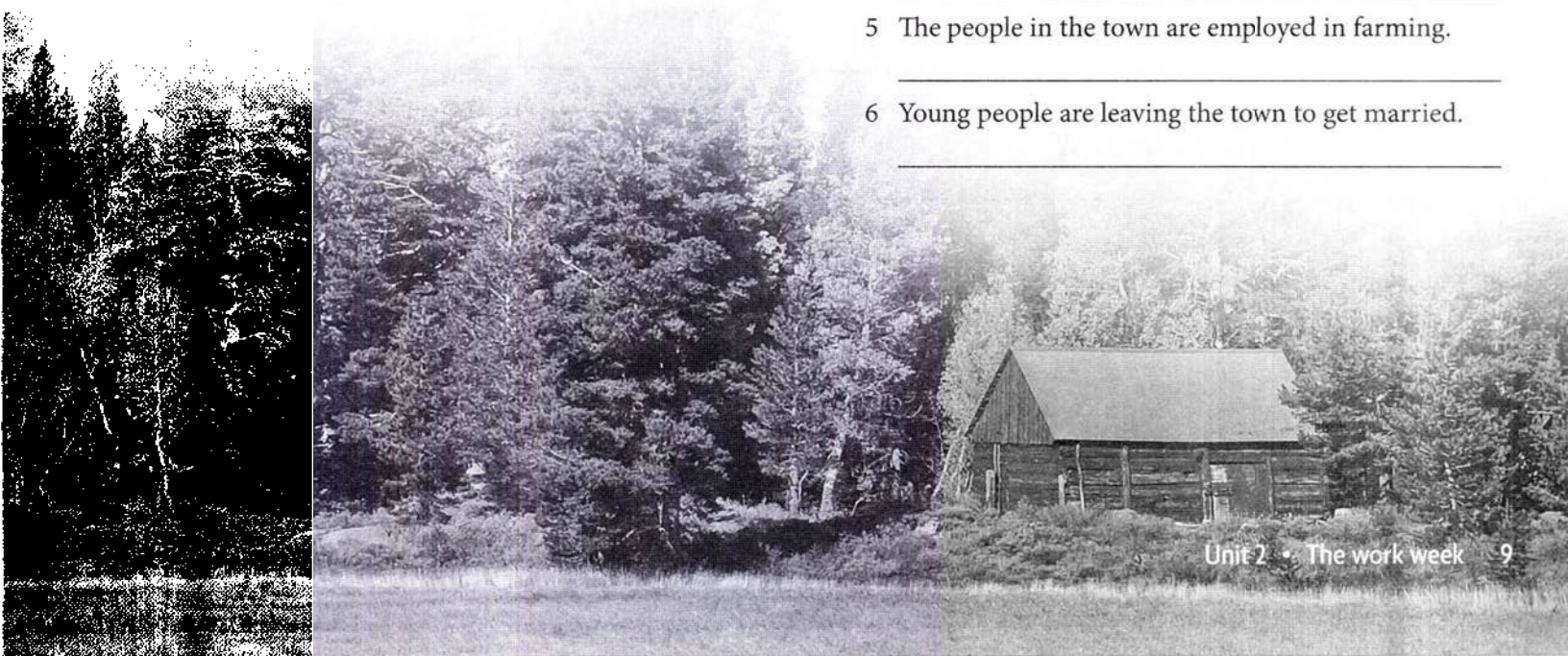

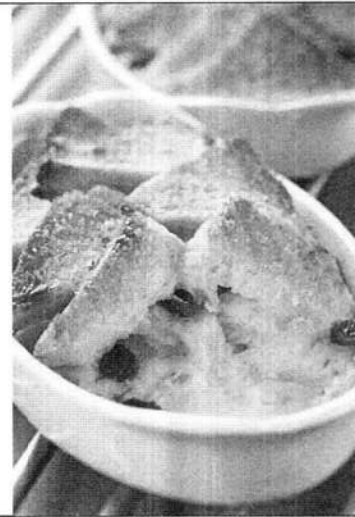

Billionaire rips a hole in his Picasso worth millions



Steve Wynn, the billionaire art collector, *felt* extremely embarrassed after he *had damaged* one of his own paintings by putting a hole in the canvas.

Wynn, the 107th richest man in America, runs hotels and casinos in Las Vegas. He owns a Matisse, a Renoir, a Van Gogh, a Gauguin, and several Warhols.

He *bought* a Picasso, *Le Rêve* (*The Dream*) in 1997. It *was painted* in 1932, and it depicts Picasso's mistress as she is sitting daydreaming. Wynn *paid* \$48 million for it.

Despite being one of his favorite pictures, Wynn *had decided* to sell it. He *had been negotiating* with an investor, Steven Cohen, and they *had agreed* on a price of \$139 million.

The weekend before the sale, some friends of his *were visiting* from New York, staying in one of his hotels. They *wanted* to see the picture, which *was hanging* in his office, before it *was sold*. Wynn *was standing* in front of the picture and explaining its history when he accidentally *put* his elbow through the canvas.

The picture *was repaired* by an art restorer in New York. It is now impossible to see where it *was damaged*. Not surprisingly, Cohen no longer *wanted* to buy it, so Wynn *put* it in a vault for safe keeping.

Years later, in 2013, Cohen finally *bought* the painting for \$155 million, \$16 million more than the original price. Although Wynn *had received* an insurance payment of \$45 million after damaging the painting, the restoration *only cost* him around \$90,000. He certainly *made* quite a profit!

Tips for visitors to the U.S.

The weather You *should check* the weather before you come. The weather varies from region to region.

Food and drink In most coffee shops you *have to buy* your drink at the counter, then carry your drink to a table. You are usually served at a table in a nice cafe or restaurant.

Tipping is a problem. You *don't have to leave* a tip in a coffee shop, but in a restaurant you *should leave* about 15–20%. Similarly you *can tip* a taxi driver if you want.

In a restaurant, you *shouldn't say* "Give me the menu!" or "I want some water!" This is considered very rude. You *should be* polite and say "Could I have the menu, please." We tend to say "Please" and "Thank you" a lot.

People You *shouldn't address* people as "Mr." or "Mrs." We usually say: "Good morning," not "Good morning, Mr."

Transportation Obviously, you *have to have* a driver's license to rent a car, and the law says you *must wear* a seat belt in the back seat as well as the front. In some states, you *aren't allowed to use* your cell phone while driving.

Tourism The U.S. is a big country! You *can see* many different types of cities and landscapes, but you *can't do* it all in one trip. You *should choose* one region to explore — for example, Miami and the Florida keys, or Las Vegas and the Grand Canyon.

In rural areas, you may *have to rent* a car to get around, but in most cities, you *can get around* on the subway or other public transportation.

You *should research* the city or region before you visit to maximize your experience.

General You *can get* cash from ATM machines, which are everywhere.

You *aren't allowed to smoke* in any public buildings. You *can't smoke* in restaurants.

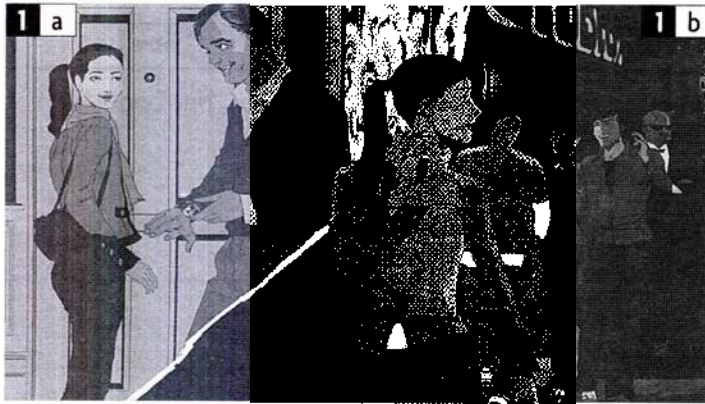

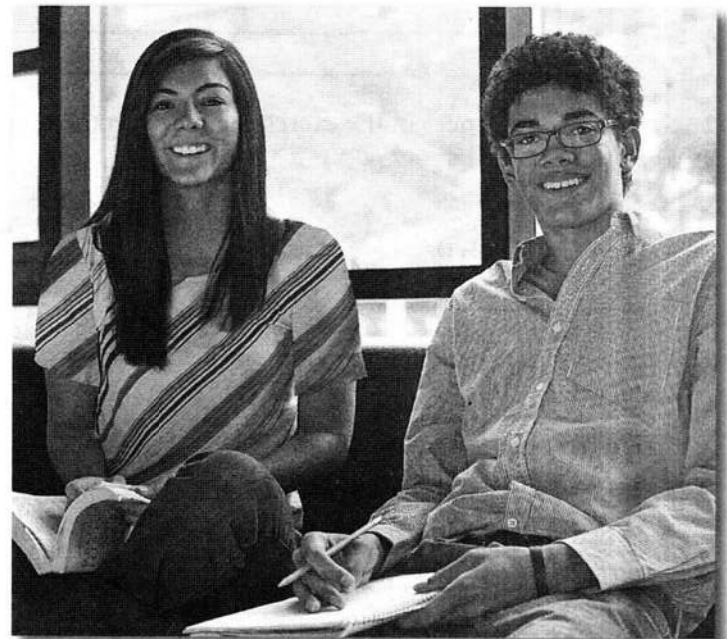

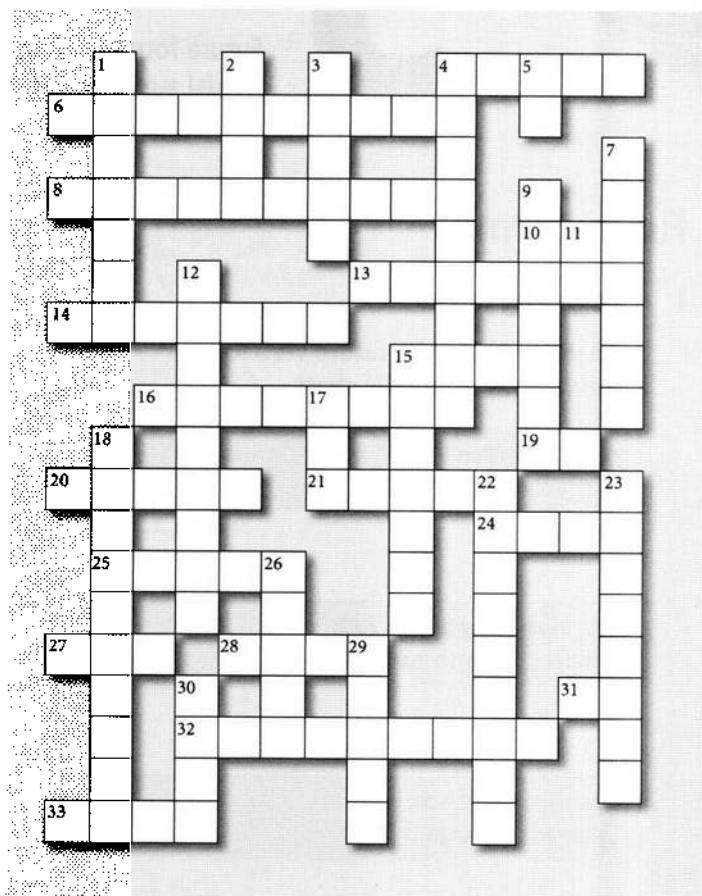

IS IT THE END FOR MANY CALIFORNIAN FARMERS?



Like many other farmers in California, rice farmer Mike DeWit is facing huge problems caused by the severe droughts of the past few years. This year, because of water restrictions, DeWit *will farm* less than 40% of the fields he farmed two years ago. This means he's *not going to rent* another tractor, he's *not hiring* a driver, and he's *not going to*

buy as much fertilizer. In short, DeWit *won't produce* as much rice to be processed and sold and he *is going to lose* money, and his reduced crop *is going to have* a disastrous effect on other people in the industry.

Overall, the University of California, Davis estimates that the California farming industry *will lose* \$2.7 billion and over 18,000 jobs this year alone. Next year *might prove* to be worse.

Climate scientists predict more trouble in the future: rising temperatures *will result* in drier land and longer, more severe droughts. This *may lead* to crop shortages, which *could cause* food prices to rise. If greenhouse gas emissions are not controlled, California *could experience* a "megadrought" – a drought far worse than any the U.S. has ever seen.

It's hard to be optimistic in the face of such predictions, but many California farmers, and scientists, remain hopeful. New technology *could help* farmers conserve and use water more efficiently in the future. Some believe that hydroponics – growing plants in water in greenhouses, which uses ten times less water than growing them in a field – *might offer* a solution to the problem.

Whatever the solution *might be*, if farmers don't find it soon, the U.S. *may face* a food crisis of epic proportions in just a few years.

Identical twins mixed up at birth reunite

Jorge, 24, a designer at an engineering company in Bogotá, couldn't believe his eyes when his coworker showed him a photo of a young butcher she had met at a local butcher shop. The butcher's name was William and he looked just like Jorge! Jorge was even more surprised when he looked at William's Facebook profile and saw several photos of him with another young man who was the image of Jorge's own brother, Carlos. What was going on?

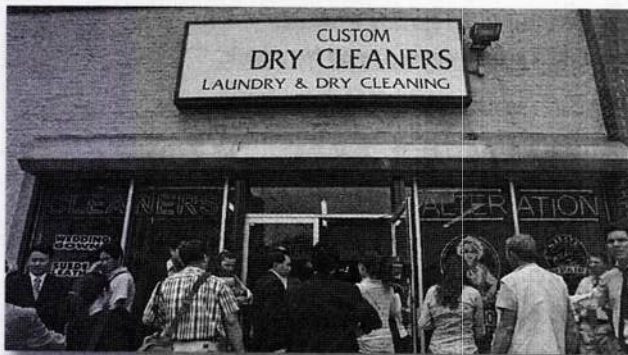

The \$54 million pants

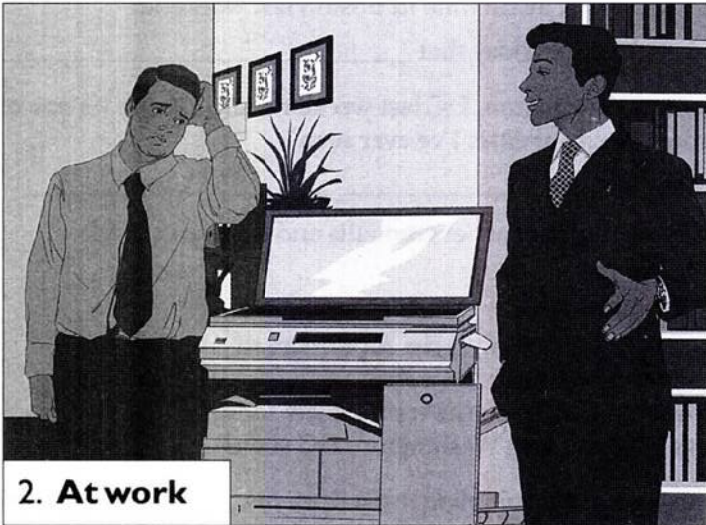

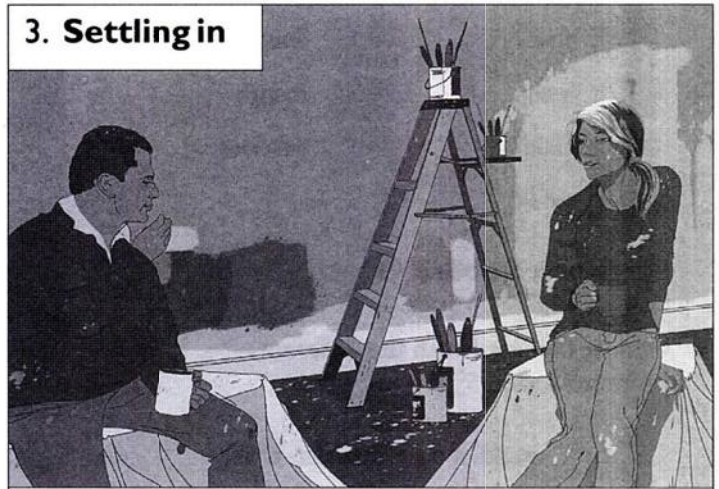

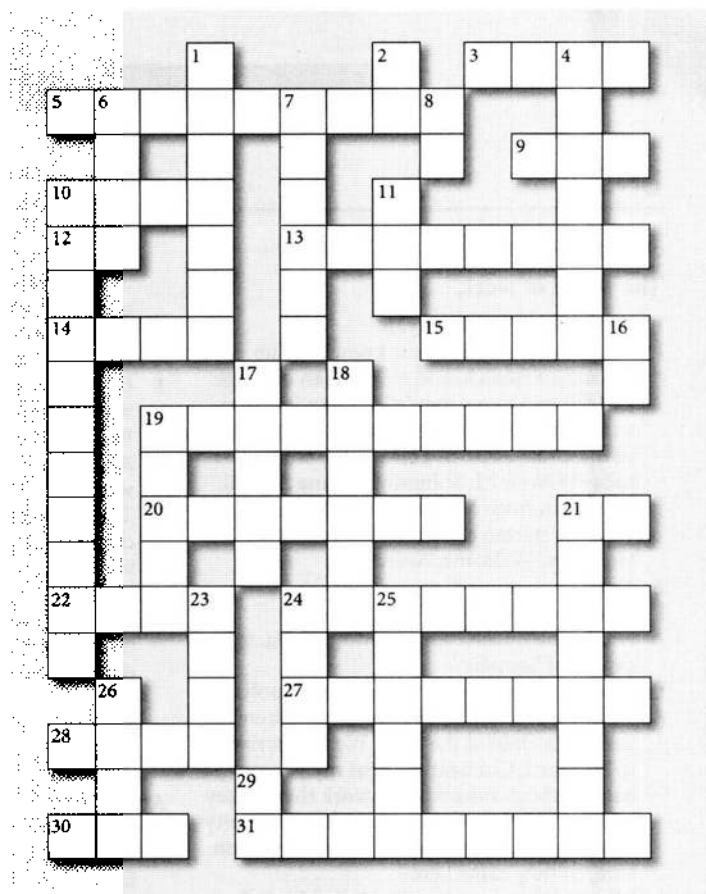

- I The state of Minnesota is known for its German, Swedish, and Norwegian heritage. But did you know that Minnesota is home to the largest Somali immigrant population in the United States? Here in the studio today is Ayan Ali Shimbir, a young Somali American from Minneapolis, Minnesota, who has started a community center for teenagers. Welcome, Ayan.
- A Hello.
- I Ayan, were you born in Minnesota?
- A No, I wasn't. I was born in Mogadishu, the capital of Somalia.
- I When did you first arrive in Minneapolis?
- A Well, I came here in 1996 with my parents. I was just a child at the time. We first arrived in Hartford, Connecticut, but my parents had a difficult time finding work there. They heard about the growing Somali community in Minneapolis, and my father had a cousin here, so they came here.
- I Why did they come to the United States?
- A To chase the American Dream! A better life! But also to get out of Somalia. You may know that in the early 1990s, Somalia was experiencing a terrible civil war. My parents had to leave the country. They wanted a safe place to live and raise their family.
- I Minnesota's winters are pretty difficult. It doesn't seem like the kind of place that people from a hot country like Somalia would like to live. Have you and your family learned to love the winter?
- A My parents definitely hate the weather, but I try to make the best of it. I've learned how to ski and ice skate! The reason Somalis stay here is because of the community. We help and support each other a lot. For example, if I need money to start a business, I don't go to a bank. I ask someone in the Somali community.
- I Somali businesses have been very successful in Minnesota, correct?
- A Yes, they have. There is a whole section of Minneapolis called "Little Mogadishu." Hundreds of Somalis own businesses—for example, my father has a shop that sells cell phones and other electronics, and my mother works at her friend's beauty shop.
- I Wow. That's interesting!
- A The Somali immigrant community has been successful in other ways, too. More and more young Somalis are going to college. The University of Minnesota's Somali Student Association has over 500 members. The community is also producing politicians, writers, artists, photographers ... even a movie star!
- I Oh, yes, of course! Barkhad Abdi, who won awards for his role in the film *Captain Phillips*, starring Tom Hanks.
- A Abdi's family also left Somalia during the civil war.
- I That's a great success story. So what are you doing to help young Somalis succeed in your community?
- A Well, although many Somali immigrants have been successful here, a lot of newer immigrants are having a difficult time. Some don't have a very high level of English ... many have come here without knowing anyone in the area ...
- I What about racism—are there any problems with that?
- A Yes, there certainly are. A lot of Minnesotans really don't know much about the Somali community, and there's a lot of negative focus in the news and the media. We're trying to change that and increase communication between the Somali community and the local community. We organize cultural events so that Somali teenagers and teenagers from Minnesota and other cultures can share food and music and learn about each other. We also offer a number of different programs and activities to get young Somalis interested and involved in education, art, sports, and nature.
- I Do you think you will ever move back to Somalia?
- A No, I won't. I've been here most of my life now. I'm Minnesotan! I don't think my parents will either. Their life is here now. Our life is here.
- I Thanks so much for joining us today, Ayan.

M That's right.

L But you're now known for promoting traditional British cooking, which isn't very popular. Why is that?

M Well, I get very frustrated when people say that British cooking isn't very exciting. You know, I tell someone how much I love a good steak pie or a traditional fruit pudding, and they say, "Yeah, hne, but it's all a bit ordinary, isn't it?" Well, I don't agree. I think simple traditional cooking using the best ingredients is never boring and always tasty.

L So, what are you making for us today?

M I'm making a really classic recipe—bread and butter pudding.

L Oh, great—I love bread pudding!

M Yeah, always popular, and it costs next to nothing to make as well. Now, I normally just use raisins in this, but today I'm putting some fresh orange in as well.

L Really? That sounds good. So, you're buttering the bread now—what kind of bread is that?

M It's just an ordinary white loaf, sliced quite thin, with a good sharp bread knife. Right, now I'm heating the milk, cream, and vanilla in a pan, and while that's warming up, I'm whisking the egg yolks and sugar in a bowl.

L How much vanilla extract do you put in?

M I'd say about 5 or 6 drops. And now for the orange—mmm, look at that, a nice organic beauty. These are grown in the Mediterranean, and you can just see all the sunshine that goes into them.

L It does look good, doesn't it? And you're going to peel and chop that?

M No, look, I'm just grating the rind into the raisins.

- L OK, and now you're putting the bread into the baking dish.
- M That's right, in three layers, with the raisins and orange in between. Now, let's see if that milk's cool enough now—yep, that seems about right—so I'm mixing this into the egg yolks ... and now I'm pouring it over the bread. And that's it. Leave it to stand for a while.
- L How long?
- M About 20–30 minutes, and then put it in the oven for about 30–40 minutes, and that's 350°F. It needs to be cooked until the top is brown and crispy. Like this one I made earlier.
- L Mmm, just the way I like it. Can this be served now?
- M You bet!
- L Mmmm, that's so good. And people say they don't think much of British cooking ...
- M Well, they don't know what they're missing, do they?

Interview with a stuntwoman

- I In this next part of Film Focus, we are going to look at a less well-known aspect of the movie industry—now, we're all familiar with the term "stuntman," but we don't often hear about "stuntwomen." They do exist, of course, and my final guest today is Carla Simpson, who's succeeded in becoming one of Hollywood's top stuntwomen. Hello and welcome, Carla Simpson.
- C Thanks.
- I So, Carla, tell me, why is it so easy to forget that stuntwomen exist?
- C Well, you need to remember that until relatively recently you didn't often see women doing dangerous things in action movies; it was very much a man's world, and if a woman was involved, the stunt would still be done by a man.
- I What? Dressed up?
- C Yes. Well, it's not that difficult to make a man look like a woman, is it? As long as the camera doesn't get too close! But of course these days we expect women to do the stunts, just like the guys, and stuntwomen are actually very much in demand right now. Ever since movies like *Lara Croft Tomb Raider* and the *Matrix* films, there have been lots more high-powered action roles for women, which is great!
- I And had you always planned to become a stuntwoman?
- C No, I'd never planned to at all—I wanted to be an actor originally. I managed to get into acting school, but I really wasn't very good at it. My teacher knew I was a bit of an adrenaline junkie, and she told me to think about doing stunt work. It just grew from there.
- I Were you a bit of a tomboy as a child?
- C Oh yes, I was pretty fearless, and I remember climbing trees and jumping off high walls when I was very young. I was always trying to beat the boys, and I've always loved doing extreme sports. That's the great thing—I get paid for doing it now! It's unbelievable!
- I So, how do you actually go about becoming a stuntwoman? Are there schools you can go to?
- C Not really, it's more a case of finding a trainer to work with. You *do* have to be very highly trained, in an incredible range of skills—driving, and that includes motorcycles, climbing, falling from high buildings, using weapons, then there's fire work, hand fighting, horse work—especially falling off, of course.
- I And you have to be able to do *all* those?
- C Uh, you don't *have* to, but the more the better. That way you get more work. But most stunt people tend to specialize in one or two areas. For example, I don't mind doing fire work, but I'd rather not do it, whereas I actually enjoy doing high falls.

- I But do you ever get scared when you're doing some stunts?
- C Well, you know, there's nothing wrong with being afraid of getting hurt badly, and many stunts are life-threatening if they're not fully prepared. That's the key to it, serious preparation. If things aren't properly prepared, I complain, and you need to make sure that everyone is concentrating 100% during a stunt. You minimize the risks.
- I Have you been hurt?
- C You often get hurt, even on simple stunts, which is why they can't let the actors do them—it's too expensive for them to be off work, even for a day or two. But in the stunt world, we only call it being hurt if you need an ambulance.
- I Mmm, it doesn't sound like my idea of fun, I must say.
- C Maybe not, but you know, when people ask me about being scared, I always tell them, what really scares me is the idea of wasting your life, not living it to the fullest—that's a truly terrifying thought to me.
- I That's a great note to end on. Thanks a lot, Carla.
- C Thank you.
