### Robot – You're Fired!

While the world in general is getting increasingly excited about artificial intelligence entering the home via virtual assistants and robots, the world's first robot hotel in Japan has fired over half of its robot staff. The Henn-na Hotel made the decision after its robots were found to be generating more work instead of reducing it.

When the hotel opened in 2015 in the Huis Ten Bosch theme park in Nagasaki, its objective was to be the world's most efficient hotel by having 90% of the staff as robots, thus keeping labor costs down. With 82 robots, it was mainly used by Japanese families visiting the theme park. The following year it entered *Guinness World Records* as "the first robot-staffed hotel." With robotic dinosaurs in reception, it started attracting international visitors lured by Japan's image as a technological pioneer. Fueled by this positive response, the Henn-na "employed" even more robotic staff, such as human and dog robotic dancers.

Unfortunately, the robot dancers, there purely for entertainment value, started constantly breaking down, which meant employing people to repair them. Guests had problems communicating with their in-room robot assistant Chu-ri-chan, who couldn't respond to simple requests. Some guests couldn't switch "Churi," as she is affectionately known, off. Others were awoken by their helper in the middle of the night when their assistant was activated by a random sound or even by the guests themselves snoring. With no phones in the room, guests turned to Churi to solve the problems she was causing, which led to even more frustration.

The word 'Hen' means both "strange" and "change" in Japanese. It was the latter that the designers had in mind. For the moment, it looks like the Henn-na will mainly be attracting visitors seeking an unusual experience more than those seeking the hotel of the future.
