Getting around Hong Kong

With its large population in a small space, and its hills, mountains and islands, you might think it's difficult to get around in Hong Kong. But, in fact, the opposite is true. Hong Kong has a wide range of public transport options, and they're cheap, fast and well-organised. So what options are available?

Before travelling, you should buy an Octopus card. This works on all public transport and you can put money on it very easily – in shops or online. There's even an app you can download for this. You don't have to worry about what type of ticket to buy. You just put the card on the machines when you enter and exit the transport.

The trains here are excellent, and there are several different types. Together they are called the MTR (Mass Transit Railway) system. The trains go all around Hong Kong. You can even go to China if you want to! There is also a range of buses and electric trams. Travelling in these can be an enjoyable way to get to know the city. The tram system is one of the oldest in the world. It was planned in 1881, and first started running in 1904.

If you want to walk around the Mid-levels area, the escalator (moving stairs) is a great way to get up the big hills there. It is 135 metres high from bottom to top, and it's the longest covered escalator in the world at 800 metres. It's also free to use, so you don't have to pay!

Finally, no visit to Hong Kong would be complete without going on a ferry. These boats travel to and from many of the islands that are part of the city, such as Cheung Chau and Ma Wan's Park Island. The most popular one is the ferry from Hong Kong to Kowloon Island. You should use your Octopus card to travel. Then, enjoy seeing the beautiful city from the water.
